MO WOMEN'S NETWORK EQUITY ACTION DAY

When strong women unite, we have the power to make a difference. On Tuesday, April 4, Missouri women will gather in Jefferson City to let our representatives know what we care about. Busses will leave from St. Louis and Kansas City (AAUW MO Impact Grant reduces bus cost). The cost of the St. Louis bus is \$30. Participants may order a Panera box lunch for \$11. It will include ½ a sandwich, ½ salad, chips, and a cookie.

Although women from collaborating organizations will lobby legislators on different subjects, AAUW members will focus on the gender pay gap to ask legislators' support of legislation to close the gap. Members will be trained on the bus about talking points and will be given a packet of information for their legislators. It is rare to actually meet your representatives in their offices. Usually we leave the material with the administrative assistant.

Professor Robertson is the chair of the political science department at the University of Missouri St. Louis and the University of Missouri Curators Teaching Professor. PUBLIC POLICY

Pay Equity Efforts

As a follow-up to the Women's Marches in January, millions of women around the world took action on International Women's Day to advance gender equality. For AAUW, it wasn't a day off, but rather a day on. We know women can't afford to wait for equality, and it won't happen without mobilized action. Here in Missouri we are keeping up the fight for fair pay by making weekly contacts with our legislators and asking them to support equal pay for equal work. Let Pat Shores know if you would like to participate.

Equal Rights Amendment (ERA)

The Nevada Senate ratified the ERA on March 1 with the expectation that it would pass the full body. If it does pass, only two more states are needed to ratify the ERA. Wouldn't it be ironic if the current threat to the rights of women would have the unintended consequence of passing the ERA? Judy Morgan put forth the ERA bill again in the Missouri House, and Jill Schupp filed the bill in the Missouri Senate. 79 Examples of How Women Are Still Treated Unequally

- ~ Of the workers who make more than \$100,000 in the U.S., only 27 percent are women.
- ~ More than three-quarters of public school teachers are women, but a mere 20 percent of superintendents are women.
- ~ Fewer than 19 percent of patents have at least one female inventor.
- ~ Women are primary inventors in only 8 percent of patents.
- ~ Women college athletes receive \$176 million less in scholarships annually than what their male counterparts receive.
- ~ Soccer players on the U.S. women's national team earn less than half of what those on the men's national team earn.
- ~ An online tool called Rate My Professor found that evaluations by both male and female students were likely to refer to male teachers as "brilliant" or "smart" and to women professors as "rude" or "strict."


