PUBLIC POLICY

Get Out the Vote was a successful campaign. More than 150 new voters were signed up at the St. Louis Community Colleges, and 500 applications were handed out in the metro area.

Human Trafficking had another win for protecting children against sex trafficking. The Supreme Court decreed that *Backpage*, the market leader in commercial sex online advertising, has to hand over documents to the nonpartisan Senate investigation into online sex trafficking. Claire McCaskill chairs this committee.

The St. Charles Coalition Against Human Trafficking (SCCAT) is hosting a second conference, which is totally supported by our AAUW Community Action Grant. The conference will be held on Tuesday, January 10, 2017. Please SAVE THE DATE and plan to attend. There will be an all new program where you will experience all the pieces of the human trafficking puzzle.

Lisa Maatz, AAUW Vice-President of Government Relations and Advocacy, released an inaugural edition of the new member-only monthly e-bulletin **AAUW in the Statehouse.** Due to keen member interest, AAUW is working hard to bring members more state-specific policy resources.

Please plan to join our branch efforts during the 2017 Missouri legislative session by contacting legislators about passing an equal pay law in our state.

From AAUW's 79 Examples of How Women are <u>Still</u> Treated Unequally, shared by Co-President Barb at the October Board Meeting

Entertainment & Media:

~ Men directed 86 percent of all TV episodes in 2013 and 2014.

~Nearly 2/3 of bylines, on-camera appearances, and producer credits were listed to men, while women constituted only 1/3 of these contributions.

~Even among the top-grossing G-rated family films, girl characters are outnumbered by boy characters 3:1.

~Only 7 percent of directors, 13 percent of writers, and 20 percent of producers are women.

~In 2014, about 30 percent of TV news directors were women. While this is a very low number, it is actually a record high.

~Only four women directors have been nominated for a directing Oscar. ~Women are shown on air to report segments on foreign affairs and national security only 22 percent of the time.

LEGAL ADVOCACY FUND

The Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF) works to challenge sex discrimination in higher education and the workplace. Our resources range from community outreach programs to the backing of major cases. Sex discrimination today takes a variety of forms: unfair pay, pregnancy discrimination, sexual harassment, sexual assault, and violations of *Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972*, which can affect both women and men. LAF addresses these barriers by informing people of their rights and using the legal system to seek justice and change.

Many significant cases come before the courts in which LAF has not been involved. One such case occurred in St. Louis and was reported by Colleen Flaherty*. Following a jury trial, a Missouri court decided that St. Louis University must pay \$367,000 in damages to a former professor who alleged she was denied tenure because of her gender. Cornelia Horn was an assistant professor of theology from 2004 to 2012. Her complaint says that she was one of a handful of women in her department and of 20 professors, just two were female. It further says that she experienced "bullying and intimidation" from her male peers, and she was retaliated against for reporting this.

Horn's application for tenure was a lengthy process and when tenure was denied, she alleged that it was not based on her credentials but on her speaking out against the culture of the department. The jury decided with Horn's gender discrimination claim 9 to 3. The vote for Horn's retaliation claim was 11 to 1 in Horn's favor.
