BALLWIN-CHESTERFIELD COMPLETES AAUW COMMUNITY ACTION GRANT, BREAKING THE CHAINS OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING

The Ballwin-Chesterfield grant committee, in conjunction with SCCAT and other groups, exceeded the goals set for the second, and final year of the AAUW Community Action Grant. Twenty-Five *Human Trafficking 101* presentations were given to people who live, work and go to school in St. Charles County, and 10 more people were trained to give the program.

The main goal for the second year was to hold a second St. Louis Metro conference in the series, *Breaking the Chains of Human Trafficking*. The committee presented an all new program in which 110 participants put together the pieces of the human trafficking puzzle and looked for Zoey who had been trafficked. Presenters came from seven organizations.

Since there were funds remaining, a third conference geared toward professionals working in the migrant and immigrant field was held. The eleven sponsor organizations included many interfaith groups. One hundred people attended, and presenters came from eight organizations. This event was featured on the local television news.

All grant activities and events were publicized in the networks of our collaborating groups. Community leaders were taught to direct other groups to fight human trafficking in St. Charles County and beyond. Altogether, we significantly exceeded our two-year goal of educating 800 people regarding the extent of human trafficking in their own communities.

Pat and Barb Butchart want to thank the Ballwin-Chesterfield Public Policy Committee and every branch member who supported grant activities between 2015 and 2017. We made a significant difference in the knowledge people have about this serious violation of human rights that is happening in their own backyards.

The Department of Education is still considering rolling back or weakening the Title IX guidance and regulations that have been crucial to preventing and ending sex discrimination in our schools. AAUW will work to strengthen and protect Title IX. Closing the Gender Pay Gap is crucial as women's overall wages remain stalled behind men's. AAUW will lead the fight for equal pay legislation and continue programs that empower women to ask for salaries they deserve.

LEGAL ADVOCACY FUND

The branch Legal Advocacy Fund committee held its first meeting in July to make plans for the year. The committee is dedicated to supporting the national efforts and to keeping the branch informed about new cases as they are adopted.

The Legal Advocacy Fund works to challenge sex discrimination in higher education and the workplace. National resources range from community outreach programs to backing of major cases.

Sex discrimination today takes a variety of forms. Unfair pay, pregnancy discrimination, sexual harassment, sexual assault, and violations of *Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972* can affect both women and men. LAF addresses these barriers by informing people of their rights and using the legal system to seek justice and change.

We are pleased that Ebonee Avery-Washington has joined the national staff as Project Manager for LAF.
