Barbara Kelley

Barbara Kelley, a long-time member of AAUW, died in France on November 14 after a long struggle with cancer. Barb had taught French at Parkway West and later at Parkway Central High School and was foreign language department chair at each school.

Barb loved the French language and all things French. About ten years ago, her husband Bob was transferred to France, where she continued teaching. She started a class for women who wanted to improve their English conversation skills. She also taught orientation classes for English-speaking newcomers to Rueil, and provided English translations for historic markers in the town. Before moving, Barb was active in Ballwin-Chesterfield, serving as newsletter editor and leader of the Movie Group. She was an avid reader and a member of Literature I, and sponsored many Dollars for Scholars events. Barb also volunteered extensively, translating old letters for the Historical Society, reading books on tape for the blind, and cooking for the St. Patrick Center.

When back in St. Louis, Barb continued to be involved in AAUW. She often brought little treasures from France for the auction, including an antique christening gown.

Barb was a devoted correspondent, sending regular "Paris Notes" to many of us, detailing daily life and extensive travels. She also continued her love of movies, frequently sending suggestions for French films to look for.

She is survived by her husband, Bob, two sisters, a brother, and many nieces and nephews. She will be missed by the many people she touched all over the world.

LEGAL ADVOCACY FUND

Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF) continues to vigorously advocate for Title IX. In the November online issue of the *LAF Express*, the recipients of the \$750 Campus Outreach Grants were announced. Their projects are as follows:

- 1. The University of Michigan's student organization will host a tabling series, educating students on Title IX and sexual assault.
- 2. Lock Haven University's local AAUW branch will put on a panel featuring women in STEM.
- 3. Washington State University's local AAUW branch will arrange a convening of women leaders.
- 4. Valparaiso University (Indiana) student organization will hold a workshop on sexual assault and women's leadership.

The Ballwin-Chesterfield Branch could consider working with a local campus to apply for a grant next year.

LAF also announced three new cases which it has adopted: Portz v. St. Cloud State University and Minnesota State College and University Systems, Spencer v. Virginia State University, and Robb v. Lock Haven.

Nathalie Gosset, LAF plaintiff, shares her experience in Gretchen Carlson's new book *Be Fierce: Stop Harassment and Take Your Power Back.* In September 2016, LAF adopted Gosset's case through its case support program. The book chronicles stories from women who confronted workplace harassment. This book looks to be a good "read and discuss" book for our reading groups.

EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES FUND

Through the generous donations of our members during the November Giving event to the AAUW Fund, Ballwin-Chesterfield contributed \$2655 to AAUW programs, which help women throughout the United States succeed in reaching goals that may not have otherwise been attainable due to financial constraints. Since November giving, further contributions were made to national online. **Thank you again to all who donated.**

Sales of used books, puzzles, and CDs will resume at the January branch meeting and continue at each meeting through April. From sales of the past two months, we have earned \$408. Again, thank you for participating, and you are encouraged to continue to buy books, bring books, buy more books! We look forward to another very successful year.

We had the pleasure of meeting and speaking with President Mark Lombardi, who expressed appreciation to the branch for the \$1000 Scholarship which the branch awards each term. PUBLIC POLICY

The U.S. House Committee on Education and the Workforce introduced H.R. 4508, a bill that proposes vast changes to the Higher Education Act. The proposed alterations would affect a number of AAUW's priority issues, including student debt and campus sexual assault. The plan would include changes to federal student loan borrowing, income-based repayment, and loan forgiveness. The reauthorization bill also alters the Clery Act which provides much-needed transparency in the fight against campus sexual violence.

The proposed bill to overhaul the HEA will make college more expensive and further out of reach for many. It also weakens campus safeguards. H.R. 4508 would:

- a) Eliminate student loan forgiveness for public service employees and alter income-driven repayment options, increasing debt burdens for struggling borrowers.
- b) Weaken schools' abilities to prevent and end campus sexual assault and support survivors.
- c) Fail to strengthen the Pell Grant program, which makes college possible for millions of low-income students, or increase its annual grant amount to reflect inflation.

Please urge your representative to oppose H.R. 4508.

An important date to remember is January 11, which is Human Traffic Awareness Day. On January 4, 2010 former President Obama issued a proclamation naming January as National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month.


