PRESIDENTS' CORNER

We are all aware that there is a large gender dap in leadership in every field, from business and government, to all others. AAUW is working to lessen that gap by shaping the next generation of leaders. Among the many programs are AAUW Campus Ambassadors. These women represent AAUW at their schools, receiving leadership tips monthly. Campus Action Projects are annual, grant-funded, student-led projects that allow students to take action on women's issues on campus. On the AAUW website, you can read about a wide variety of these projects, ranging from mentoring of younger women, to STEM projects, to a "Be the Revolution" series that led to more females in student government. Start Smart, a project many of us are familiar with, teaches salary

negotiation skills so that women don't begin their careers behind their male peers. Go to https://www.aauw.org/what-we-do/campusprograms/.

Perhaps the most influential of these programs is the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders, (NCCWSL, pronounced "nick whistle"). Nearly 800 college women and campus professionals will be meeting at the University of Maryland, College Park, from May 30 through June 2, 2018, to build skills, listen to inspiring speakers, and network. This year Ballwin-Chesterfield contributed \$2000 to AAUW to provide scholarships for a few young women to attend this program. This contribution was funded by Dollars for Scholars sponsors and participants. In addition, the branch contributed \$500 to Interbranch Council (IBC) toward the NCCWSL fund. Our own Shima Rostami, a graduate student at Lindenwood University, will be one of two young women from St. Louis attending because of support from IBC. By the way, last December, several members from Ballwin-Chesterfield and other local branches wrapped gifts at Barnes and Noble, raising approximately \$700 toward the IBC NCCWSL fund. Consider joining in the fun next year.

Our branch is proud of the scholarships we offer to local women. We can add NCCWSL to that list.

MO WOMEN'S NETWORK EQUITY ACTION DAY

When strong women unite, we have the power to make a difference. On Tuesday, April 10, Missouri women will gather in Jefferson City to let our representatives know what we care about. You may arrange your own transportation or join us on the bus (the reduced \$27 fare is subsidized by AAUW MO); bus seats are limited to the first 24. Participants may order a Panera box lunch for \$11 which will include a $\frac{1}{2}$ sandwich (choice of 3), a $\frac{1}{2}$ salad, a French baguette, and a cookie (assorted).

Although women from collaborating organizations will lobby legislators on different subjects, AAUW members will focus on the gender pay gap to ask for legislators' support of legislation to close the gap. Members will be trained on the bus about talking points and will be given a packet of information for themselves and for their legislators. It is rare to actually meet your representatives in their offices. Usually we leave the material with the administrative assistant.

Ryan D. Kulik has spent over 20 years working as a lobbyist and public relations consultant with an emphasis in government communications. He specializes in taking controversial issues and creating new partnerships with the goal of implementing positive social change. Through <u>SeedSing.com</u>, Mr. Kulik has created a community of independent journalists who, without influence or bias, spotlight the politics and popular culture of the day.

With the rise of inexpensive technology, recent years have seen the global communities get more connected. Many people, like Mr. Kulik, thought this new global connectivity would advance the humanist philosophy and bring freedom to a large group of people. MEMBERSHIP DUES FOR 2018-19

The AAUW year begins anew on July 1, 2018, thus your current membership expires on June 30. As you know, the AAUW Board of Directors voted to increase the national annual membership dues from \$49 to \$59 in 2018–19. AAUW MO dues are \$10 and Ballwin-Chesterfield branch dues are \$22, which totals \$91 for the upcoming year. Fifty-six dollars of the national dues is tax deductible.

The preferred method to renew is online. B-C members should watch for a personalized renewal email on March 16 from <u>memberinfo@aauw.org</u>. Simply open the message and click on "click here to renew". With one click, pay dues with your credit card. It's simple, safe, and efficient. The alternate method is to send your \$91 check to Pat Shores. Write your check to AAUW; do not put B-C on the memo line.

The Finance Officer and the Membership VPs are offering an early dues payment incentive. Dues renewal begins on March 16 and members who renew from March 16–April 30, will get three chances to win a \$25 gift card to Panera. Members who renew from May 1–May 31 will get two chances to win the \$25 Panera gift card. Members who renew from June 1–June 30 will have one chance to win the \$25 gift card.

AAUW NATIONAL BOARD BYLAWS PROPOSALS

The AAUW National Board of Directors has voted to put three proposals for bylaws amendments before the membership for a vote this spring. For complete information, including member comments, see <u>https://www.aauw.org/resource/faq-national-election/</u>. The proposals are very important, and, if passed, will have a major impact on the future and character of AAUW. Please evaluate carefully and be sure to vote. The proposals are as follows:

PROPOSAL ONE: Stagger the terms of office of members of the Board of Directors on a three-year rotation. This proposal would insure continuity.

PROPOSAL TWO: Open the Board of Directors' membership to non-AAUW members. It is proposed that five of the board members be non-AAUW members and the other ten, AAUW members. This is intended to broaden the expertise of the board.

PROPOSAL THREE: Eliminate the degree requirements for membership in AAUW. This proposal would open membership to anyone willing to join and pay dues.

Members can comment online on the proposals through March 22, 2018. Paper ballots can be requested starting April 16 and must be received by National by May 21. Online voting opens on April 25 and closes on June 9, 2018.

Be on the lookout for your PIN number in April and check back in June for voting results online.

LEGAL ADVOCACY FUND Legal Advocacy in Action: AAUW Signs On to New

Amicus Brief

<u>Doe v. Boyertown Area School District</u>, currently in the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit, involves the <u>rights of</u> <u>transgender students under Title IX</u>. The plaintiffs are students who sued their school district in Pennsylvania to discontinue the district's policy of permitting transgender students to use the facilities that align with their gender identity, arguing that the possibility of being in the presence of a transgender student violates their privacy rights and amounts to a hostile environment, which is a violation of <u>Title</u> <u>IX</u>. On August 25, 2017, Judge Edward G. Smith of the U.S. District Court for Eastern Pennsylvania denied the plaintiffs' motion for a preliminary injunction that would require the school district to revert to its previous practice before it permitted transgender students to use the facility of their choice, but the plaintiffs appealed to the district court.

AAUW, along with 12 other organizations, signed on to <u>an</u> <u>amicus brief</u> in support of the Boyertown school district. According to the brief, "To meet Congress's goal of eradicating sex discrimination in education, Title IX defines discrimination on the basis of sex broadly to include a prohibition on sex stereotyping." Sex stereotyping is the idea that an individual must conform to the traditional cultural norms of the gender typically associated with their sex. From *LAF Express*, February 2018.

PUBLIC POLICY

One of AAUW's 2017-19 Biennial Action priorities is the vigorous enforcement of Title IX and all other civil rights laws. AAUW and AAUW MO Public Policy have made the Title IX Coordinators Delivery Project a priority. Through this project, AAUW members are creating awareness about the purpose and provisions of Title IX: how students are coping in athletics: monitoring the gender ratio in STEM and Career and Technical Education (CTE); working to prevent and end sexual harassment and violence; and supporting pregnant and parenting students. The Title IX Coordinators Delivery Project gives AAUW branches an opportunity to build relationships with local Title IX coordinators to work together to commit to protect students' civil rights. Our branch will be assigned one or more school districts to work with. Public schools K-12 must follow Title IX.

Now more than ever, we need to protect our students as information continues to surface regarding what happened to our Olympic athletes, and how they weren't protected even though Title IX has been the law since 1972. The US Department of Education announced plans to open a Title IX investigation at Michigan State University to assess the institution's systemic issues in responding to the sexual misconduct allegations against Dr. Larry Nassar, a former faculty member now convicted on numerous accounts of sexual assault. The Office of Federal Student Aid, in conjunction with the Office of Civil Rights, has opened an investigation of the school's compliance with *The Clery Act*. AAUW urges a comprehensive review.
