Thomasina Clarke Mary Thomas Speaks Her Life

Fake News, Social Media and the Impact on Freedom of the Press

Kevin Horrigan, a long time St. Louis journalist, recently retired as deputy editorial page editor and Sunday op-ed columnist for the *St Louis Post-Dispatch*, where he spent most of his professional career. During his 40 + year career as a journalist, he served as reporter, editor, opinion writer, and columnist. In 1983 Mr. Horrigan joined the *St. Louis Sun*, after which he launched his 10-year career as a radio talk show host at KMOX and KTRS. He returned to the *Post-Dispatch* in 2000 as an editorial writer and columnist. Many of us are familiar with his keen observations and savvy wit and still miss his weekly contributions on subjects both national and international.

Public Policy

The recent launch of <u>Work Smart Online</u> is poised to accelerate toward its ambitious goal of training 10 million women in salary negotiation by 2022. AAUW is encouraging all members to take the course and share with family members and friends.

AAUW's <u>Work Smart</u> curriculum is based on the best research on how to navigate the complexity of job offers and promotions. Through presentations and interactive exercises, participants learn to research fair and equitable salaries and benefits in their fields (and geographic areas) and to tout the unique skills and experience they bring to the table. Participants also learn the precise words and tactics to use when negotiating, all of which help build the needed confidence to negotiate a fair salary or promotion.

Why is negotiation so important? <u>AAUW's research</u> on the gender pay gap shows that, <u>one year out of college</u>, women are already paid significantly less than men. Women who work full time take home <u>80 cents</u> for every dollar a full-time male worker is paid. Over a lifetime, lost potential earnings continue to add up. Women who negotiate increase their potential to earn higher salaries and better benefit packages. By negotiating fair and equitable salaries, women will be better able to pay off loans, increase income, and even save for retirement. Please consider taking Work Smart Online.

LAF

January was Human Trafficking Awareness Month. During this month you heard and saw information about this issue in the media. The St. Louis Law Enforcement Trafficking Task Force prepared a public service announcement (PSA) which made us more aware of the extent of the problem in our area, and several of the local television and radio stations devoted programs to this subject.

According to Polaris, a human trafficking advocacy organization, Missouri currently has the 17th most human trafficking cases reported in the country. Statistics are often misleading since it is hard to be accurate where the issue is often hidden and victims fail to report the problem themselves.

Some factors leading to sex trafficking in the St. Louis area are location, social media, poverty, dysfunctional homes, and juveniles recruiting other juveniles. Labor trafficking includes industries such as landscaping, healthcare, nail salons and beauty services, construction, agriculture, and domestic services. Law enforcement agencies face a great many challenges in controlling trafficking issues and say that more resources would be helpful.

AAUW states that human trafficking disproportionately affects women and girls. It states that 71 percent of trafficking victims are women and girls, and that 72 percent of female victims are trafficked for sexual exploitation. What can we do to help? We can work to get stronger legislation passed at both the national and state levels. We can be observant. Notice what is going on around you and report your suspicions to the National Human Trafficking Resource Center at 888-373-7888, where you can leave an anonymous tip.
