Notes from the Finance Officer Membership Renewal for 2020-21

The AAUW year begins anew on July 1, 2020, thus your current membership expires on June 30. The national annual dues are \$59. AAUW MO dues are \$10 and Ballwin-Chesterfield branch dues are \$22, which totals \$91 for the upcoming year. Fifty-six dollars of the national dues are tax deductible.

The preferred method to renew is online. If you do not renew by June 30, B-C members will receive a personalized email on July 16 and August 16 from memberinfo@aauw.org. Open the message and click on "click here to renew". With one click, pay dues with your credit card. It's simple, safe, and efficient. The alternate method is to send your \$91 check to Pat Shores. Write your check to AAUW B-C.

The Finance Officer and the Membership VPs are offering an early dues payment incentive. Members who renew from June 1 to June 30 will have one chance to win a Panera gift card.

More than half our members have paid their dues early this year. This is very much appreciated by the Membership Chairs and the Finance Officer because it helps us know who is returning to the branch in time to prepare for the new year.

AAUW Fund

The 2019–20 year has seen five fellowships and grants awarded to students and non-profits in the St. Louis area. Michelle Bach received an American Fellowship to St. Louis University where she is seeking her doctoral degree in health care ethics. Sara Lichtsinn received a Career Development Grant to Maryville University; she is seeking her master's degree in accounting. One of the sponsors of Sara's grant is Ballwin-Chesterfield. Andrea Warner has received a Career Development Grant at University of Missouri-Columbia. She is pursuing her master's degree in public and nonprofit management.

FOCUS St. Louis (https://focusnorthamerica.org/where-we-work/st-louis/) and its director, Yemi Akande-Bartsch, have received a Community Action Grant to promote FOCUS Women in Leadership-STEM program. This grant is partially funded by the Ballwin-Chesterfield Silver Anniversary Grant. Room at the Inn and its director, David Weber, have received a Community Action Grant for the program Equal Chance/Equal Hope to aid homeless women and girls to improve their success in school.

Public Policy

Our country has been through a lot during the last few months—COVID-19, issues of racism, economic insecurity, and more. Hopefully, you and your family are safe and healthy. Many may not be as fortunate. That is why AAUW advocacy is especially important.

- 1. Read AAUW's statement on racism, available on our website, and Kim Churches' letter to AAUW members asking us to listen, learn about systemic racism, have discussions regarding injustices, and vote.
- Make sure you have completed the 2020 Census and remind others to do so. The census determines congressional
 representation and how hundreds of billions of federal dollars are allocated to communities for hospitals, fire
 departments, schools, and lunch programs. Every person not counted costs local areas about \$13,000 for ten years.
- 3. Register and vote in the August election. More information is in this newsletter on page 5.
- 4. Know the candidate's position on issues.
- 5. AAUW MO supports voting YES on Amendment #2-Medicaid Expansion. Why?
 - It expands eligibility to individuals aged 19—64 making under \$17,000 or couples earning under \$23,000.
 - Residents in 36 states that expanded Medicaid have better health outcomes and also saw lower mortality rates
 - It is projected to bring insurance coverage to 215,000 Missourians. Approximately 90,000 children and 23,000 adults lost coverage last year.
 - By not having expanded Medicaid, the Missouri state legislature rejected \$15 billion in federal funding.
 - It will support health care infrastructure in rural Missouri, where six hospitals have closed. (information from hwvmissouri.org and missourihealthcareforall.org)

The Science Fair became an e-fair. Our judges, Sandra Murdock and Jean Elliott, had no trouble picking the winners online. The two girls who won were from the Honors Division. They are Rayna Friedman, whose entry was Effects of Non-Pharmaceutical Treatments of Music Therapy & Aromatized Essential Oil on Blood Pressure, and Margie Lodes, whose entry was the Effects of Endocrine-Disrupting Chemicals on Crayfish in a Freshwater Ecosystem. Both projects were well thought out and interesting. The girls were each given a MOST 529 scholarship for college and a congratulatory letter from our branch.
