Life After Lock-Up: The Reality of Re-Entry

Shawntelle L. Fisher
Founder/CEO
SoulFisher Ministries



Shawntelle L. Fisher is an influential leader, speaker, teacher, and dancer who serves with excellence and integrity. Shawntelle became a mother at age 15 and a convicted felon at age 17. After going to prison seven times, she decided to become a Christian and allow God to transform her into the person He had created her to be. This transformation led her back to college and to start The SoulFisher Ministries, a nonprofit she now leads under the direction of her board. The mission of SoulFisher Ministries is to respond to the needs of youth with incarcerated parents and to promote restorative justice for those currently and formerly incarcerated.

Shawntelle holds both a bachelor of educational studies and a bachelor of science in media studies from the University of Missouri-St. Louis. She earned dual master's degrees in social work and divinity from Washington University and Eden Theological Seminary, respectively. She is also a Licensed Master Social Worker. Since starting The SoulFisher Ministries in 2012, Shawntelle has raised more than \$2.5 million in funding to support their work in the St. Louis community. She has also provided numerous workshops on dismantling the school-to-prison pipeline, re-entry simulations, and trainings with the Missouri Chapter of the National Association of Social Workers.

From the Finance Officer **The 2022 dues will go up \$3**

As you may recall, the AAUW Board of Directors voted in October to increase the individual member dues for the next three years. As a result, when the Financial Officer and the Vice Presidents for Membership offer an incentive plan for the early payment of dues starting in March, the amounts will be \$62 national (previous \$59 plus the \$3 increase), \$10 for AAUW MO, and \$22 for Ballwin-Chesterfield. Dues for 2021-22 will total \$94, which is \$3 more than last year.

AAUW Board President Julie Brown notified members of the dues increase in the *Notice of Due Adjustment*, October 30, 2020.

STEM: A Mighty Woman, Katherine Johnson

Excerpts from *Katherine Johnson: The NASA 'Computer' Who Launched a Man into Space and Women into STEM*, by Liz Mundy.

Born in 1918, Katherine Johnson was a precocious child who counted everything from stars to stair steps. She received a full academic scholarship to the historically Black West Virginia State College, from which she graduated summa cum laude with degrees in math and French. She was hired in 1953 to work at what was then called NACA, the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics. At Langley, she joined a community of female mathematicians, Black and white, that dated back to...World War II.

In 1958, NACA became NASA; the mission expanded to embrace space; and that's when Katherine Johnson began her work for the space task force, calculating the trajectories of spacecraft. In 1961, the Freedom 7 mission sent astronaut Alan Shepard...hurtling up into space; thanks to Johnson, he also came down, safely.

It does not detract from Johnson's genius to say that in her life of stunning achievement...she also represented a cohort of women who pioneered the STEM field in the mid-20th century, and who are only now beginning to receive credit. There is now a Katherine G. Johnson Computational Research Facility at NASA. Women's contributions to computer science are finally being commemorated in a public way.

Why Do We Keep Trying?

The year 2020 was lost in its own reality. From our isolation, we have found that priorities have become simpler, like the procurement of stockpiled household goods or getting food delivered hot and on time. It is easy to lament the days that we spend in confinement; however, we have been among the most fortunate women in today's society. Most of us are no longer in the work force and have the financial means to ride out the pandemic. AAUW recognizes that most working women today are not as fortunate as we are because of the ongoing wage gap.

Before the pandemic, all women were still lagging behind their male counterparts who have similar education. When put alongside white, non-Hispanic men, Black, Latina, and Native American women have seen their wage gaps stay the same or have experienced an increase. The sad truth is that women of color with high school diplomas earned around 66 percent of the salaries of their male counterparts with the same education. Women of color did not see much of a boost if they had college educations; in fact, Black women's earnings ratio actually dropped slightly when they received a degree.

This is why it is so important to support the work of AAUW. Research such as "What's behind the Wage Gap" is recognized and used in important places in this country. We are a leader in women's research and we are influencing the future.

Thank you to all who supported efforts to get the vote out in the Georgia run-off election by sending postcards to registered voters.

We will long remember the events of January 6 when Congress convened to count the electoral votes submitted by the states and to certify the election of the next President and Vice-President of the United States. AAUW has signed on to the Women's Community Statement on President Trump's removal from office.

We hope you were able to participate in the MO Women's Annual Legislative Retreat on January 16. Thank you for your participation. Stay tuned for the outcomes of this retreat and how you can engage in influencing national, state and local legislators in support of AAUW's mission.

The U.S. House of Representatives started 2021 by re-introducing H.R. 1, the *For the People Act*. This act addresses barriers to accessible voting such as no-excuse absentee voting, early voting opportunities, improvement in voter registration and tracking processes and support of non-partisan redistricting commissions. AAUW MO, in conjunction with the Missouri Voter Protection Coalition, supports passage of H.R. 1. There are two ways you can help:

1. Sign the Declaration for American Democracy petition at [dfadcoalition.org](https://www.dfadcoalition.org).
2. Call your U.S. House of Representative at 1-888-246-5947 to urge their support in passing this act.

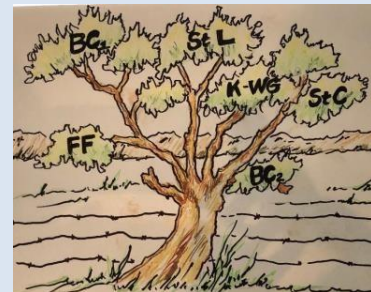
