As you read this column, we are hopefully beginning to enjoy spring weather. We appreciate all of you who spent the winter together with us virtually and continued to support AAUW's mission of equity for women and girls through our branch, IBC, state and national actions and events.

Beginning on April 7, we will have the opportunity to vote in the AAUW national election for an important bylaw amendment and to select Public Policy Priorities for the next two years. I urge you to consider the reasons why the entire National Board is supporting the change in membership requirements:

- AAUW needs to include members with diverse backgrounds and perspectives to meet our mission of advancing gender equity and today's societal needs.
- Simply put, this is about inclusion. AAUW's vision is Equity for All. Membership practices should align with this vision.
- Times have changed. Younger feminists care about our mission but don't join because they see us as an exclusionary or elitist organization, one that hasn't evolved into modern thinking about equity and inclusion.
- Corporations and foundations prefer to work with and/or fund organizations that adhere to their diversity, inclusion, and equity policies and practices. We lose out on dollars that could help us move forward with our mission and vision which puts a bigger burden on members to contribute to AAUW.

Advancing the Cause:
Strategies for Different Stages of Life

Dr. Gorman brings a unique combination of medical training, entrepreneurial vision and operational excellence. She is currently the CEO of Healthy Bytes, a company that connects registered dietitians to providers and employers.

Dr. Gorman was a founder and Lead Managing Partner at Prosper Capital in St. Louis. This venture fund increased women entrepreneurs' access to early growth capital and mentorship resources and invested in 29 women-led companies. She founded and built the largest national telemedicine company in the Intensive Care Unit space, Advanced ICU Care. Dr. Gorman started one of the first hospitalist groups in the United States, grew this into the largest provider in St. Louis, and later sold the company to IPC-The Hospitalist Co.

Dr. Gorman serves on the board at Check-Cap (CHEK). Her non-profit board service includes membership on BioGenerator and she is a member and past board chair of Marian Middle School. She received the 2013 Distinguished Alumni Award from Washington University's Olin School of Business, the 2011 Ernst & Young Entrepreneurial Winning Women Class of 2011 and was named to the 2009 Top Influential Women in Healthcare by Modern Healthcare Magazine. She earned her master's degree from Washington University, her medical degree from Southern Illinois University, and a bachelor's degree in chemistry/biology from St. Louis University.

Renewing Your Membership The 2021–22 dues will increase by \$3

The AAUW Board of Directors voted in October to increase the individual member dues over the next three years. Dues for 2022 will be \$62 for national (previous \$59 plus \$3 increase), \$10 for state, and \$22 for Ballwin-Chesterfield for a **grand total of \$94** which is \$3 more than last year's total. Fifty-nine dollars of the national dues will be tax deductible. For more information see the October 30, 2020 *Notice of Dues Adjustment* document from AAUW Board Chair Julia Brown.

The AAUW year begins anew on July 1, 2021, thus your current membership expires on June 30. The preferred method to renew is online. B-C members should have received a personalized renewal email on March 20 from memberinfo@aauw.org. Open the message and click on, "click here to renew." With one click, pay dues with your credit card. It's simple, safe, and efficient. The alternate method is to send your \$94 check to Pat Shores. Write your check to AAUW.

The finance officer and the membership vice presidents are offering an early dues payment incentive. Members who renew from March 16–April 30 will get three chances to win a \$30 Panera gift card. Members who renew from May 1–31 will get two chances to win the gift card. Members who renew from June 1–30 will have one chance to win.

April 13: Dr. Akiko Tsuchiya, Professor of Spanish and of Women, Gender, and Sexuality Studies Topic: *Historical Heritage and Art*

Dr. Tsuchiya is the author of a book on the nineteenth-century Spanish novelist Benito Pérez Galdós and has published extensively on nineteenth-and twentieth-century Iberian literatures and cultures. Her research and teaching interests include the realist novel, women's and gender studies, nineteenth-century women's transnational literary and cultural networks, race and colonialism, and slavery and antislavery in the Hispanic world. Most recently, she has become engaged in public debates generated around monuments related to colonialism and slavery in the Iberian world.

Nominating Committee Officer Slate for 2021–22

As the year 2020–21 has been most unusual because of the pandemic, the nominating committee, with the confirmation of bylaws officer Marsha Weppelman, has prepared a slate of nominees for the next year. The nominees will look familiar as they have agreed to stay on this next year, if elected. Training new people in a time when in-person activities have been suspended would be difficult in many cases.

In the branch bylaws, you may reference the following statement in Article X, Section d. Terms. Elected officers and elected and appointed directors shall serve a term of two (2) years or until their successors have been elected or appointed and assumed office. The term of each officer or director shall begin on July 1.

AAUW Membership Requirement

Open

Every spring, AAUW members vote to elect directors. Every other year, they vote to approve Public Policy Priorities. Occasionally, they vote to amend the bylaws. This year, we will be doing all three. You will be receiving a link to your ballot beginning April 7. The proposed amendment is to eliminate the AAUW membership requirement of a college degree. We are an organization that promotes equity, yet we do not treat non-degree individuals as equal.

Our mission is to advance gender equity. The vision is equity for all, but we do not treat non-degree individuals as equals. It is time to bring AAUW membership criteria in line with its mission to advance gender equity that does not have any educational requirement.

While the degree requirement may have made sense early in our history, by today's standards it is perceived as elitist, exclusionary, and out of touch. We must stay relevant. We need to send a clear message that we welcome all who share our values and goals regardless of whether or not they hold a college degree.

Voting is online April 7—May 17, 2021. The amendment needs 2/3 of votes cast to pass. Your vote is important for the future of AAUW.

AAUW Fund: New Research

AAUW advances gender equity through research, education and advocacy. Research helps us understand the important happenings in our world. AAUW's recent research does just that. Factory Flaw: The Attrition and Retention of Women in Manufacturing is a significant addition to the research about the pursuit of economic security for women.

This study looks at the loss of manufacturing jobs in the 2000's and how it has disproportionally hurt women. The study points out the causes of this loss of jobs. They are persistent problems that include sexual harassment, inequities in pay and promotion and dissatisfaction with family leave. More women leave their jobs in manufacturing than in other industries. The study then suggests remedies to overcome these problems. Two Spring STEM Events

This year's St. Louis Science Fair will once again be conducted as an e-fair, with online judging to be completed on Monday, April 26. AAUW Ballwin-Chesterfield judges will be Sandra Murdock and Jean Elliott. Our branch will honor three girls from the Honors Division whose science projects are deemed outstanding. Each of these students will receive a \$125 MOST 529 college scholarship and an emailed congratulatory message from AAUW Ballwin-Chesterfield.

In late April or early May, up to five junior girls from Valley Park High School and five from Maplewood Richmond Heights High School will receive a STEM Girls of Promise award. As we did last year, in lieu of being recognized at an in-person ceremony, each student will receive an attractive gift box that contains a medal, certificate, check, and personal letter of congratulations from AAUW Ballwin-Chesterfield.

Social safety – no mask needed

Social media can be a gold mine for hackers. Kids' social media accounts are often easily invaded, and your home router becomes an avenue for the hackers. Hackers can access your financial and banking data, and your contacts and privacy. We love social media but realize that it is not secure. What to do?

You will have a router in your home. Be sure the router has a secure password. Use a mix of letters and numbers and store the password in a secure place. For younger children, monitor their internet use and teach caution. For older children, have a frank discussion of internet safety, what hackers can do (and have done) to inconvenience and threaten families, and what such an occurrence will mean to them. Remind them that what is posted remains forever.

Slow down, think before clicking, have good and frequently changed passwords, and current anti-virus software. Apple and Microsoft offer good free anti-virus software. Create different email accounts for different functions. Maybe use a different credit card or bank account only for online purchases!

Mercifully, hackers are most often after bigger targets than the home user. Back up your personal data frequently, perhaps monthly, and keep it separate from your computer. This is easy to do these days and there are different options to do so. Flash drives are cheap and can hold almost everything on your hard drive. Don't leave flash drive plugged in, though, eject and store safely.

Be safe, be aware, be a responsible user.


