***Crossing the Red Sea:
St. Louis and the Exodus
of 1879***



In 1879, thousands of African Americans fled the post-Reconstruction South in search of political, economic, and social opportunity, many heading to Kansas. Called “Exodusters” after the Biblical story of escape from oppression, they often arrived in St. Louis destitute, and city officials refused to help. To the stranded Exodusters, St. Louis became a barrier as formidable as the Red Sea. However, Dr. Jack will show how African Americans in St. Louis came together to sustain these people’s needs and help them on their way.

Many will recall his fascinating presentation on *Understanding Missouri as a Southern State* a few years ago. This presentation should prove to be equally interesting, as we learn more about the complicated history of our area.

I am a scientist. To be specific, I am a woman scientist. This, I have been told and come to believe, is a good thing. In fact, it is such a good thing that America needs more of us. Since 1919, AAUW has worked to make it happen. When Madam Curie's research was halted due to a lack of funding, AAUW members helped raise an astonishing \$156,413. This enabled Curie to purchase one gram of radium to continue her research and work towards the creation of nuclear chemistry. The research forever changed the course of science.

Our branch also works to make it happen with a variety of STEM programs. These programs are explained on our website, ballwin-chesterfield.com, Community Outreach, and focus on ways to help grow proud STEM girls. One way is creating a brochure, *A Parent's Guide to Raising STEM Daughters*, which we will share later with schools and members. Besides information on STEM, the brochure lists useful web resources to help make it happen for our girls; *STEM Kits for Kids*, www.kiwi.com; *Kids Educational Toys and Learning Games*, www.learningresources.com; *The Ultimate STEM Guide for KIDS: 239 Cool Sites*.

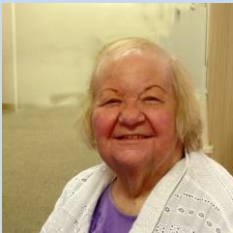

AAUW Fund

AAUW Action Priority: To achieve economic security for all women

AAUW recently updated its signature report, *The Simple Truth About the Gender Pay Gap*. In 2020, women earned 83 cents for every dollar paid to a man, about the same as prior years. This figure reflects those women who have remained in the workforce and does not consider the millions of women who lost or left jobs due to the pandemic. The unemployment rate for women rose more dramatically than for men, and the percentage of women in the labor force fell to the lowest it has been in decades. As job recovery begins, women are not realizing the same gains as men and 1.5 million mothers still have not returned to the workforce. Time out of the workforce affects lifetime earnings, and many employers still rely on previous wages to set salaries, further reinforcing pay discrimination. Unemployment as a result of the pandemic could compound gender pay gaps, diminishing economic security for women through their lifespan. The pandemic did not create new inequalities; it simply deepened disparities that have existed for generations. Closing the pay gap requires structural solutions such as passage of the *Paycheck Fairness Act*, the *Family and Medical Insurance Leave Act*, and *Raise the Wage Act*. *The Simple Truth About the Gender Pay Gap*, 2021 update can be found at www.aauw.org/resources/research/simple-truth/

Exhibits Manager of the History Museum, Katie Moon, curated the exhibition and says: "Our challenge was how to tell the story in the best way for our visitors. How do we really talk about women before they had a political voice and debunk the idea that they weren't doing anything before they received the right to vote? We wanted to show respect for these women."
