ERA, Unfinished Business for the Constitution

The Equal Rights Amendment states: Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex.

The bill was introduced in Congress in 1923, and was reintroduced every year until its passage in 1972. Finally, Congress gave state legislatures until 1982 to ratify the amendment. In 2020, Virginia became the 38th and final state needed to meet the extended three-fourths ratification requirement. However, the ERA continues to face challenges. The Senate's effort to ratify the ERA failed in April, 100 years after it was introduced to Congress. The House has taken no action.

ERA advocates have laid out a strategy for final recognition of the ERA according to *Roxy Szal, Ms. Magazine, October 9, 2023*:

- A joint congressional resolution to remove the timeline and recognize the ratification of the ERA.
- A separate congressional resolution, called the ERA Now resolution, instructing the archivist to publish the ERA as the 28th Amendment.
- A discharge petition, which seeks to compel the House of Representatives to vote on H.J. Res.25 to remove the arbitrary deadline for ratification.
- A petition drive to show widespread support for the amendment.

On the December 13 Day of Action, the ERA Coalition, which includes AAUW, told our elected officials that we want them to publish the ERA now. The December 7 *AAUW Washington Update* revealed that the U.S. is the only modern democracy that does not include sex equality in the Constitution. Without the ERA, advances in women's rights that we took for granted are at risk of being weakened or even reversed. Waiting a century for over half of the U.S. population to attain constitutional equality is long enough! AAUW encourages us to, "Take action and tell Congress, not one more year."

January 9, 2024 Rising costs of Health Care in the U.S.: Why is our System the Most Expensive in the World and is that Changing?

Dr. Timothy McBride is the Bernard Becker Professor at Washington University in the Brown School and co-Director of the Center for Advancing Health Services Policy and Economics Research (CAHSPER) in the Institute for Public Health (IPH). Dr. McBride is an influential health policy analyst and health economist shaping the national agenda on the uninsured and health insurance markets, rural health care, health reform, Medicare and Medicaid policy, long-term care, and health economics. For two decades, he has been active in working with the U.S. Congress and state policymakers, providing policy advice on a regular basis on health reform, Medicare, Medicaid, and rural health policy. He was the first

Associate Dean for Public Health at Washington University, leading the initial development of the Brown

School's Master of Public Health (MPH) program to accreditation in 2011. He led the creation of the first Health Policy program at Saint Louis University. A member of several national committees and Boards, Dr. McBride is currently serving as Vice Chair for St. Louis Board of Health and serves on the Justice Services Board for St. Louis County. He is past Chair of the MOHealthNET Oversight Committee, which serves in an advisory role for the state of Missouri's Medicaid program. In 2012, Dr. McBride was awarded the Outstanding Rural Health Researcher of the Year by the National Rural Health Association and a "Health Care Hero" by the St. Louis Business Journal in 2007.

February 13, 2024 Generative Al

Some of the recent advances in AI that can be clubbed under the term "Generative AI" have raised new questions around ethics and safety of AI. Safety recalls in automobiles and other consumer products are common. Today the case for safety recalls in AI products is more imminent than in any other sector given the scale of impact AI has on our society, economy, and discourse. Regulations around AI have not even kept pace with





advances that happened in AI a decade ago, and now we are grappling with the impact of Generative AI.

Dr. Anshuman Singh is an AI educator, researcher, entrepreneur, and a hacker in the traditional meaning of the term. He is the co-founder and Chief Academic Officer at an education startup that is building an online AI university. Prior to this, he was the curriculum architect at <u>DeepLearning.AI</u>, working with AI pioneer Andrew Ng leading the development of AI courses that have been taken by millions of learners around the world. Dr. Singh was in academia for a decade and was an Associate Professor at the University of Missouri-St Louis until 2022.

Dr. Singh's specialization is at the intersection of artificial intelligence and cybersecurity. In the past, he has also worked as a research scientist on DARPA and Air Force-funded research projects on the application of artificial intelligence. He earned his PhD in Computer Science from the University of Louisiana at Lafayette. He holds the CISSP and GPEN certifications and is a certified ethical hacker.




