Action & Advocacy - Living the Mission of AAUW



AAUW MO President Sue Shineman has designated this as the framework theme for AAUW's work state-wide. Her focus word for this year is collaboration. Sue is asking each member of the state board, every branch and its members to embrace the theme and support plans to carry out the Mission. The following is a Q & A with Sue to provide insight into the who, what, where, when, and why of her theme.

Sue, please tell *Missouri in Motion* readers about current and future projects which advance AAUW's mission in Missouri.

What are current and planned GOTV projects?

Sue: this will be Action & Advocacy. Action would be sharing the AAUW Voter Guide, so members know which candidates and issues support our mission of advancing equity for women and girls. Advocacy could be collaborating with League of Women Voters, registering new voters or updating information for voters who have moved. Educating voters on early absentee and curbside voting. Work with local high schools to share the QR Code that will take them to online registration. Use

your personal social media platforms to support candidates that support our mission. We are nonpartisan, but we are political. Put those Your Voice is Your Vote Signs in your yard! **Alice Kitchen is your go-to person** for assistance.

What are best practices to welcome, retain, and honor our members?

Sue: First, have a welcome team at each meeting to greet guests. Membership should have a packet of information at every meeting. Assign members to introduce guests to members, sit with them, and engage them in conversation. Invite them to the next meeting or Action project. Invite speakers to join your branch. Utilize the Membership Orientation power point and AAUW Supports document. (Both are on p. 6 membership article.) **Susie Watson is your go-to person** for assistance and ideas.

College/University relationships are important to AAUW's future. Please tell us about C/U on Missouri campuses.

Sue: Our future lies with making connections with students of all ages on college campuses. Engaging students during AAUW table events is an excellent way to share our mission with them. Likewise, engage professionals **continued page 2**

An Interview with AAUW MO President Sue Shineman, continued

on campus. You could hold an informal event on campus, invite teachers and staff, and share how AAUW supports students. **Debra McArthur is your go-to person** for assistance and ideas.

How can the state board support local branches? Sue: State board members are available to come to your branch meetings and present a program. If you have questions, reach out to your counterpart on the board, or to me. If I don't know the answer, I will know where to go for help. Call, email, or text me. I am your go-to person.

What kinds of branch collaboration projects are taking place?

Sue: Now through November 4, the focus is on Get Out the Vote. This election is of utmost importance for women's rights. The next collaborations to work on are with other organizations in your community. Get out of your regular meeting place and get involved in the name of AAUW. Independence, my home branch, is taking a new approach to monthly programs (Advocacy) and volunteering for the agency or organization presenting the program (Action). For example, our program from Community Services League will be followed by an Action Project helping with their Christmas Store for school children. It could be a lunch and learn, followed by branch members and friends supporting the outreach of CSL. And of course, we will be wearing our AAUW teeshirts. I am your go-to person. Let's talk one-on-one.

STEM and DEI are both important AAUW priorities. What is going on around the state to educate and involve our members?

Sue: Both areas are continuing to grow and to collaborate with local schools and organizations. There are many opportunities for branches to collaborate with local schools on STEM projects, recognitions, and awards. DEI continues to educate and involve members in Inclusion-Infusion activities, open dialogue and hosting 'safe space' for sharing ideas and concepts. **Pam Kulp is your STEM go-to contact. Luna Mukherjee is your DEI go-to person.**

The state has an active public policy committee. How does the committee interact with local officials to promote AAUW's mission and values?

Sue: Branches are encouraged to reach out to local officials to talk about salary history, paid family leave, and pay equity. Public Policy and DEI are both focusing on Advocacy regarding the banning of books. **Alice Kitchen is your go-to contact.**

What is happening with AAUW MO's social media presence?

Sue: Having a social media presence is very important to both state and branches. We will have regular posts to the state Facebook page, Instagram, and others. Your branch and members will be able to share these posts with a branch tag line or hashtag. This is how we can reach a younger audience with our mission and vision. **April McArthur is our go-to person.**

What are future projects that we'll see in 2024-25?

Sue: There are several projects on the horizon. You can expect the focus on Succession Planning and Collaboration to be priorities. Branch presidents will meet monthly for Action & Advocacy Leader training. These meetings will include many opportunities to share and collaborate and hear from state leaders. The Wisdom Council will be developed to be available to branch leaders for mentoring. Branches will receive monthly reports from national committees. Branch enrichment opportunities will be shared to expand Action & Advocacy programs and projects.

Our thanks to Sue Shineman for sharing her vision for AAUW MO in the coming year.

Changes to MO Star Award/Branch Action Plan for 2024–25

Program VP Co-Chairs Su Bacon and Diane B. Ludwig

With the national AAUW Strategic Plan the same for 2024, **Su Bacon, Diane Ludwig**, and **Pat Shores,** state MO Action Plan coordinator, have worked to ensure that both the 2024–25 Missouri State and Branch Action Plan and the MO Star Award/Branch Action Plan remain coordinated. Both documents are useful as branches plan programs, activities, and events that further the AAUW mission and strategic plan.

Once the 2023–24 STAR Award forms were received in April 2024 and STARS were awarded, updates began. Board members reviewed their specific areas of the document to suggest edits, remove completed criteria, or add new initiatives, so the new document reflected AAUW Missouri's current directions and focus. The document was distributed to branch presidents in early June to accommodate branch planning for 2024–25.

Key areas of change were discussed at the July 2024 state board meeting. Below are the significant updates in the 2024–25 STAR Award/Branch Action Plan. Please refer to the official 2024–25 Star Award & Branch Action Plan posted on the AAUW MO website for the complete criteria.

- ✓ Utilize the state Opportunity to Serve form to help with succession planning for your branch.
- ✓ Create or hold an AAUW member orientation for **all** branch members utilizing the new orientation tools provided by the state Membership Committee.
- ✓ Use the national *Membership Matters* emails to convey national information to branch members.
- ✓ Hold at least one Get Out the Vote (GOTV) activity for national, state, or local elections. Focus on voter registration and voter education for the fall elections.
- ✓ Incorporate mission-based ACTION projects into branch activities. Collaborate with other likeminded community groups on key issues.
- ✓ Hold one month's programming open now to address current issues that arise later in the year.
- ✓ Engage in ACTION projects related to STEM and to DEI.
- ✓ Complete the national Branch Impact Survey of your branch's activities by the deadline, which will enable you to receive national STARS. (Survey sent via email to branches in September.)
- Attend via Zoom the AAUW MO sponsored Legislative Retreat held in February or March each year.

Star Award forms for 2024–25 are due on April 1, 2025, covering activities from April 1, 2024, through March 31, 2025.

AAUW Fund

AAUW Fund Chair Sage Taber

The Greatest Needs Fund needs your support to keep AAUW's mission growing. AAUW's expenses—which include member services, administration, rent, communications, and fundraising—are funded by donations. The Greatest Needs Fund also supports many of our programs, such as public policy and research. Dues cover only about 17 percent of these expenses.

The top total branch giving and top per-capita branch giving will be recognized at the AAUW MO spring conference for 2024 giving (January – December.) Branches with 50 percent and higher giving participation will be recognized. Century Club members (\$100 + donors) and Century Club Plus members (\$250+ donors) will be honored.

Public Policy

AAUW MO Public Policy Chair Alice Kitchen

Title IX–The House vote to overturn the new Title IX rules. <u>AAUW joined coalition partners</u> in opposition to the Congressional Review Act resolution (H.J. Res. 165). We had more than 1,300 members respond to our Two Minute Activist alert before the party-line vote (210-205) took place.

The Senate version of the Congressional Review Act resolution (S.J. Res. 96)— there has been no information regarding a Senate vote on this. Opponents of the new Title IX rules have also included language in the House version of the FY 25 education spending bill which would prohibit the U.S. Department of Education from using federally appropriated funds to enforce the new Title IX rules. Get Out the Vote Signs Available

With the general election coming up this year, it is especially important that people are informed voters. AAUW branches can help by making available educational nonpartisan signs to the community.

The *Get Out the Vote Sign* provides the link to connect to the League of Women Voters, <u>www.lwv.org</u>, that has all the election information a person needs in English and Spanish. People can



check their voter registration, find their polling place, and learn about candidates and ballot issues by zip code.

The signs, which were printed by the Kirkwood-Webster Groves American Association of University Women and the League of Women Voters of Metro St. Louis, have pickup spots in the St. Louis area in Kirkwood, Florissant, and Chesterfield. The signs sell for \$5.
