What Does AAUW Do?

This is the first article in a series about what AAUW does.

Policy Advocacy

AAUW focuses on national issues affecting women and girls, such as education equity, pay equity, and reproductive rights.

AAUW coordinates the Public Policy state committees, participates in coalition work, and partners with other prominent national organizations like the YWCA for the Gen Z Town Hall in Philadelphia.

AAUW National provides monthly opportunities for cross-state collaboration and information sharing between the state public policy chairs. The group has been sharing training resources on voter

engagement this summer and fall and will be providing peer-to-peer capacity training for members who want to get more engaged in legislative advocacy after the election.

The policy team has been working with Missouri President, Sue Shineman, and Missouri Public Policy Chair, Alice Kitchen, on developing a communications plan to share information about Amendment 3. Social media content, op-eds, and letters to the editors have been created in support of AAUW MO's position on the Amendment

In addition to supporting the work branches and states are doing in-state, the national policy team will also be sharing state-by-state data on the pay gap and providing targeted actions that our members can take to support federal solutions.

Ballwin-Chesterfield Scholarship Recipients By University Liaison Mary Jermak

The AAUW of Ballwin-Chesterfield Branch is pleased to announce the 2024–25 recipients of the scholarships for non-traditional women students.

Maryville University students Latosha Aytch and Nicole Zugmaier are seniors majoring in nursing and are from the St. Louis area. These women will receive a \$1000 award for each of the fall and spring semesters for a total of \$2000 each. Ms. Aytch and Ms. Zugmaier were selected by Maryville's financial aid department using B-C's scholarship criteria.

- 1. A non-traditional female student, i.e., at least 10 years post-high school,
- 2. Close to graduation,
- 3. Preferably studying in the STEM field, which is an AAUW priority.

The B-C branch has a long history of providing financial support to non-traditional women students who are close to graduation, thereby giving an assist to be employed in their field of study soon after graduation. These scholarships are funded by member sponsored Dollars for Scholars events. Member involvement in DFS, both as sponsors and attendees, is important to maintain our branch scholarship program.

Hello. My name is Celina, and I am a rising junior at Ladue Horton Watkins High School, which is pretty known for its STEM Department. I'm fortunate enough to be in an environment at Ladue and with two PHD scientists for parents, where despite the gender disparity that still exists in STEM I've had a lot of support for my interests and I've also seen support for other girls in STEM grow around me-something which no doubt, is furthered by foundations like this one which can provide concrete support.

This project was mostly inspired by my desire to work towards practical progress in climate change, as well as the synthesis of my two interests in biology and computer science. I didn't really expect to come so far, and I felt a little unprepared compared to everyone else at the fair, but I found the experience itself fulfilling. I haven't done a science fair since elementary school. I'm incredibly grateful for the experience which couldn't have existed without you.
