#### History of the Gender Pay Gap By Public Policy Committee Member Jane Hemer

The history of the gender pay gap plays a significant role in the status of women in corporate, political, and professional leadership roles in our country. After the Civil War and with the rise of the Industrial Revolution, women, particularly those of color, migrated north seeking job opportunities. They were met with enduring biases from men who felt "a woman's place is in the home" as well as discrimination, segregation, and sexual harassment, all of which caused women in the workforce to accept lower paying positions.

Despite the implementation of laws, biases and barriers continue to persist, affecting women's abilities and career advancements. For women to be successful in leadership, key factors play a part. Higher education is harder to obtain with the high costs of school loans which are difficult to repay with a lower paying job. Networking and finding mentors or sponsors are harder to secure with lower paying, lower status employment. Sexual harassment and hostile work environments are obstacles that occur in lower paying jobs. Additionally, workplaces still harbor biases that favor traditionally masculine traits of power. Viable actions by policymakers in Congress and state governments, and leadership training by organizations such as AAUW are needed to overcome the inequities in both the women's pay gap and women's leadership. levels.

#### **Our NEW IBC Fundraising Approach – Tribute Donations to Honor Sheroes**

- Why does the IBC need to raise funds? For IBC operating expenses, and to support the International Relations
  Lecture Series in collaboration with the Tuesday Women's Association of the Ethical Society.
- **Our past approach has used raffles**. In the past, each branch donated baskets of items, then we moved to raffling gift cards. We've also done 50-50 and lottery ticket tree raffles, which will continue.
- Why do we need a new approach? We have decided not to hold any more raffles or auctions because none of us wants more stuff. We believe the 50-50 and Lottery Ticket tree raffles are still worthwhile, but they won't raise all the funds we need.
- Our New Approach—We will raise the additional needed funds by honoring our Sheroes with direct donations. We hope this becomes a new tradition: honoring important women in our lives, living or in memory, through tribute donations.



#### How will this work?

Make a donation to honor a Shero in your life. Your Shero will receive a card informing them that they have been named and **your Shero's name will be part of a display at the Spring Luncheon**. <u>A final summary</u> of all names will be **published at the end of the campaign**.

#### How much should you donate?

We encourage you to be as generous as you can. Since this is a fundraiser, the minimum amount to recognize a Shero is \$10. Any level above that is appreciated.
