2025 Missouri Legislative Session Recap By Public Policy Chairs Angie Janik and Marian Bauer

The Missouri 2025 legislative session opened in January with 2,676 bills filed; 234 bills passed through committees and made it to at least one of the floors for a vote. At the close of the session,

fifty-nine bills and a budget were sent to the governor's office for signature or veto. Your Public Policy Committee was busy keeping members abreast of the bills that aligned either positively or negatively with the mission of AAUW. Here is a brief summary of the session's outcomes to date:

- HB567 changed Proposition A, and these changes go into effect August 28, 2025.
- SJR 73 seeks to remove Amendment 3 from the MO constitution replacing it with restrictions around reproductive health care provisions. SJR 73 will be put to a vote of the citizens of MO on a future ballot determined by the governor.
- SB 22 changes the process for Initiative Petitions in MO. The bill will require a vote by the citizens of MO as it changes the current process set in the MO constitution.
- The governor has called a special session of legislation to address three key issues of the budget. These include tornado relief funds, stadium subsidies and capital improvements and construction projects in HB19.

We all know that the ERA is the law of the land. Yet instead of enforcing it, elected officials continue to ignore it, allowing pay inequity, workplace discrimination, and attacks on our rights to persist.

Imagine if, instead of watching our hard-won progress on gender equality be reversed we used the ERA to strengthen securing constitutional equality for all, regardless of sex.

The fight for equal pay and equal rights is not over, and together, we can make sure the ERA is universally recognized as the 28th Amendment.
