For the first 150 years of its existence, the United States, much like a sheltered child growing bigger by the day, leveraged its geographical advantages to adopt an isolationist policy. This period of seclusion came to an abrupt end with the attack on Pearl Harbor by Japan in 1941. Following this pivotal moment, the United States utilized its wealth and military strength to establish a "Pax Americana," characterized by a web of alliances, the Cold War rivalry with the Soviet Union, and unmatched military capabilities. However, as Donald Trump embarks on his second term, American foreign policy finds itself at a critical crossroads with an uncertain future.

Joe Regenbogen is an award-winning former high school history teacher who took up writing later in life. His first two books, Questioning History and Relearning History, were intended to deepen students' historical understanding. His next two, The Boys of Brookdale and Making a Difference, chronicled the heroic lives of people he interviewed. Longs Peak and Dying of the Light are his two introspective novels.

"Greatest Needs" is four percent of the national unrestricted assets and allows AAUW to respond quickly and effectively to emerging challenges and opportunities like policy advocacy, subject matter expertise, salary negotiation training, and member services. This year you can support the Greatest Needs Fund, (9110), or designate your donation to the Defend Higher Education Fund (4513) or to the Public Policy Fund (4337). Last year forty-three members donated to the Greatest Needs Fund. This year our goal is to have fifty percent of our members give. By giving, you are supporting an organization that began in 1881 and hopefully will be around for the next generations.

The national AAUW budget is 96% restricted which means that AAUW has no flexibility on how that money is spent. The other 4% of the budget can then be used for everything else. The everything else includes big ticket items like research, webinars, publications, and national support staff, to name a few. Ballwin-Chesterfield is one of the largest branches in the United States. We have more than one hundred members, which puts us in the rare one hundred plus category that includes only 10% of the branches nationwide. Last year only forty-three people gave a personal gift to the AAUW Greatest Needs Fund. This year our goal is to double our participation.

PUBLIC POLICY

Missouri is dealing with several issues that are of concern to all of us.

The special legislative session called by Governor Kehoe in September passed their redistricting bill that changes the congressional districts to give seven seats to the Republicans and one to the Democrats. Several lawsuits have been filed to challenge this map. There is also a Referendum Petition to put the map to a vote of the people. A group named *People Not Politicians* is circulating a petition to support this cause which the AAUW Missouri state board endorses. Petitions will be available to sign at branch meetings. We need117,000 signatures, by December 11, to get this on the ballot.

Another issue of concern is HJR 3 Amendment 4 which changes the Initiative petition process that has been in the Missouri Constitution for one hundred years. It would effectively take away the people's right to one person, one vote. A petition by the group *Respect MO Voters* is circulating about this bill. The AAUW MO State Board has not endorsed this petition.

The final issue is Amendment 3 which relates to reproductive rights. The Legislature has passed a new amendment with the same number that will nullify the previous Amendment 3. It reduces the protection currently existing in the Missouri Constitution.

Continue to look for updates on these critical issues.

The *NOT SO* Simple Truth About the Gender Pay Gap Reprinted from the 2025 AAUW Supplement

The gender pay gap remains a glaring pay inequity, undermining both women's earnings and savings over their lifetime, as well as the strength of our economy. In 2023, women working full-time year-round earned just 83% of what men earned-\$55, 240 compared to \$66,790. The gap, even worse when we include part-time and seasonal workers, which increase, the pay gap to 76%, leaving women and their families at a financial disadvantage.

The challenges grow even more complex for women of color, LGBTQ+, and women with disabilities, who face compounded structural and social inequities.
